All these examples come from lives of people who could have easily focused on their misfortunes, but see what they have been given.

I invite you to end each day this month by speaking or writing about one thing for which you feel grateful. Maybe you write in journal, or say it as you fall asleep. As you begin the next day, see if you can remember what moved you to be grateful the previous day. You'll discover, if you haven't already, that our lives are a string of simple gifts.

This month, we hear services about death and focus on what we love; we remember the ideals of democracy, and explore how to live them with gracious etiquette; we look at injustice, and gratitude for how we can learn together; we honor friendships and, finally, see how grace and gratitude are woven together.
