I do not have a family history of being able to give generously. I watched my mom give financially to our church growing up and it seemed like a burden for her. It did not come from a place of generosity, but seemed like a burdensome obligation. She did also sing in the choir and the giving of her talent seemed to fill her cup. When I started attending this church over 10 years ago, I brought with me a lot of trauma and narrow views of what being involved in a church looked like.

It took me quite some time to be open to the idea of giving my time, talents and treasures. Over the last 10 years, I have tried to slowly evolve my mindset around giving. What I have found in the process is...myself. When I began my time here, I truly believed I had nothing to offer our community. It wasn't until I started challenging my beliefs about myself that I began opening myself to the possibility that I had time, financial resources and spiritual gifts to offer our community.

It has not been easy work to open myself up to a new way of thinking and operating, but I can say it has been truly rewarding. Every time I have stepped up to an opportunity to serve, I have grown as a person. UUCD has helped me develop and practice my value systems. I have learned that opening myself up to giving and receiving on a larger scale brings texture, meaning and a deeper connection to community...turns out those were things I was desperately craving.

We are grateful to those who have walked before us and have given generously, and now it is time for us to continue the mission. We all have unique gifts to contribute. I invite you to reflect on your giving mindset. In what ways can you give of yourself, time and financial support this year?
